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Exhibitor's Rules and Regulations

A subscription of \$5.00 will constitute membership in the Society and must be paid to the Arnprior Agricultural Society at the time of registration.

All entries should be made on printed forms. Forms may be obtained online or from the Society. These forms are to be filled out and signed by the exhibitor. Any errors on Entry Forms will cause delay in payment of winnings.

NOTE: A deduction of 15% may be retained from all prize money offered by the Society, except where otherwise stated and applied as ENTRY FEE.

Upon the entry of each article in the exhibit hall, a card will be completed by the exhibitor specifying the class, section and entry number. This card must remain attached to the article during the exhibition.

Upon discovery of any deception or dishonest practice in preparation or ownership, or in any misrepresentation concerning any article exhibited which may affect, or have been intended to affect the decision of the Judges, the Directors shall have the power to withhold payment of any prize awarded and may prohibit any such party or parties from exhibiting in any class for one or more years.

1. Building is closed to public while judging of hall exhibits is in progress.
2. **Everything intended for exhibition must be taken to the exhibit hall between 6:00pm and 8:30pm on WEDNESDAY AUGUST 11 and remain until 3:00pm on Sunday. Entries can be picked up between 3:00 and 4:00pm on Sunday August 14.**
3. No exhibited article shall be removed from the exhibit hall before 3:00pm on Sunday, whether awarded a prize or not. No person (other than Judges) will be allowed to touch, taste or handle anything on exhibit.
4. The Directors will use every precaution to ensure the safety of articles on exhibition, but will not be responsible for the value of any article that may be damaged, lost or stolen.
5. The exhibitor will assign full release of copyright of any images taken by the society of the exhibitor's entry for the Agricultural Society's future use including but not limited to promotional display on their website or other various media outlets.
6. While Directors will do all in their power for the safety of all attending the Fair, the Society will not be responsible for any accidents on the Grounds.

JUNIOR EXHIBITS - 2016

GENERAL RULES

1. Each exhibitor must be a member of the Junior Fair, and membership fee is \$1.00. This will entitle the member to enter any or all classes of the Junior Fair in which he or she is eligible, and also entitles the member to free admission to the fair three times.
2. Entries should be tagged **before** arrival at the fair. Tags can be picked up in advance at the fair office.
3. Special rules governing entries, exhibits, etc., are given in detail in that section.
4. Only one entry per exhibitor allowed in each section.
5. All work must be that of the exhibitor (except in the 6 & under section) and not have been previously exhibited at Arnprior Fair.
6. All entries to be in between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. Wednesday, August 11, 2015.
7. Open to members 18 years and under as of The Arnprior Fair dates, noting ages were specified.
NOTE: Individuals must exhibit in their appropriate age group and are entitled to exhibit in any higher age group in Junior Fair.
8. All entries must remain in the building until 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 14.

Prize Money: will be awarded in sections 10 to 35 as follows:
1st - \$3.50: 2nd - \$3.00: 3rd - \$2.50: 4th - \$2.00: 5th - \$1.50

JUNIOR FAIR

CLASS A

All Classes must have entry tags securely attached .

BAKING CLASSES –

MIXES NOT ALLOWED – show on paper plate, **in a zip-lock bag**, with tag securely attached to plate. **Please use a 5” or 6” plate for sections requesting three items.**

The 6 and under section (Parents may help this group!)

SECTION

3. Create a paper bag puppet of a farm animal.
- 2 Make an edible necklace using cereal and/or pasta, no longer than 40 cm.
- 3 Make 3 chocolate chip cookies and display on a paper plate, in a plastic zip bag. Include a photo of you baking with your favourite person.
- 4 Make a finger painting on 30cm x 40cm paper (maximum) using chocolate snack pudding
- 5 A page from a colouring book done in wax crayon, mounted on construction paper.
- 6 Make a craft using half an egg carton
- 7 3 carrots from your garden. Lightly brush to remove loose dirt, cut tops back to 5 cm., display on a paper plate.

7, 8 & 9 years

- 8 Create a tooth fairy box (no real teeth please)
- 9 Create a dragon using recycled materials
- 10 Create a picture of your favourite part of the farm max. size 30cm.x40cm.
- 11 Create a farm animal made from a foam cup.
- 12 Create a piece of wrapping paper (30cm.x 40cm. max.) for any occasion.
- 13 Build a Gingerbread House using a milk carton and graham crackers and your choice of embellishments
- 14 6 garden beans (all same), yellow, green or variegated, 5 cm. stem attached, displayed on a plate

10, 11 & 12 years

- 15 Design an article of jewelry, mounted on Bristol board
- 16 Collage, Theme – “Garden Vegetables”, no larger than 30cm.x40cm. no writing or title allowed on a collage.

- 17 3 banana muffins, displayed on a paper plate in a plastic zip bag. Recipe included.
- 18 Computer Art – Design a birthday invitation.
- 19 One 4”x 6” photo, ``In The Garden`` - mounted.
- 20 Farm animal sketch, maximum 30cm.x40cm
- 21 An unusually shaped vegetable or fruit from your garden, displayed on a plate or in a small cut-down box

13, 14 & 15 years

- 22 Four photos, mounted and named of local landmarks.
- 23 3 Brownie squares, displayed on a paper plate, in a plastic zip bag, recipe included
- 24 Computer Art – Design a screen saver not to exceed 30cm.x30cm.
- 25 Scrapbooking – 1 page of a special event in a plastic cover.
- 26 Computer Art – Design a birthday invitation.
- 27 Create a Farm Scene using dried beans, seeds, etc. Max. 30cm.x 40 cm.
- 28 A display of vegetables from your garden shown in a decorated canned soft drink box, minimum 5 different varieties

16, 17 & 18 years

- 33 10cm. wedge of chocolate cake, iced, on a paper plate, covered with plastic wrap.
- 34 Design a computer generated CD cover
- 35 3 each – 4cmx4cm squares of 3 different kinds of unbaked squares displayed on a suitable size plate or tray, covered with plastic

CLASS B

General Rules

1. All articles must be new and not exhibited before.
2. Only one entry per exhibitor in any one section.
3. Judges in these sections are authorized by the Society Directors to disqualify any soiled, defaced or old work.
4. The criteria used by the judges: 15 General appearance, 15 Creative Design, 20 Colour and Material, 50 Workmanship.
5. Exhibitors must pay a \$5.00 membership fee to one of the Committee Members at the time of registration.

Everything intended for exhibition must be taken to the exhibit hall between 6:00pm and 8:30pm on WEDNESDAY AUGUST 11 and remain until 3:00pm on Sunday August 14. Entries can be picked up between 3:00 and 4:00pm on Sunday August 16.

SMA – a sample of material(s) attached to the entry tag.

SYA – a sample of yarn(s) attached to the entry tag.

The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Annual Hand Quilted Championship Quilt Competition

Eligibility, Rules & Regulations

General Conditions:

- A. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 72" X 90"(smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next levels of competition).
- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and District levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.

- D. Upon making and entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

- E. The Winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

- F. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed t the Fair on a sign provided by OAAS.

Local Fair Competitions

- a. Each local fair is entitled to send only the GRAND CHAMPION QUILT, (judged the Best of Show of all eligible hand quilted quilts to the District Competition) **OR**

If any entry wind GRAND CHAMPION or Best of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST OF SHOW OF ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If and Exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

- b. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at the different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.

- c. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of all ELIGIBLE quilts, as well as RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION or SECOND BEST OF SHOW of all ELIGIBLE quilts.

The GRAND CHAMPION AND THE RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

QUILTS – Rules

All conditions of the competition must be met.

Hand Quilted

Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local OAAS fair.

Entry quilts must be a **minimum of 72'X90"** (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next levels of competition).

Machine Quilted

Quilt/Wall Hanging must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local OAAS fair.

.Quilt/Wall Hanging to be measured on the perimeter. **Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 192 inches or 480 cm.** Note the article can be square, rectangular, etc.

Sections 1-6 Prizes: 1st - \$20.00, 2nd - \$10.00, 3rd - \$5.00

1. Quilt, pieced, hand quilted, pattern named, minimum 324" perimeter, SMA
2. Quilt, appliquéd, hand quilted, pattern named, minimum 324" perimeter, SMA

4. Quilt, pieced or appliquéd, hand or machine quilted, submitted by a group – include all names of individuals in group on back of tab
5. Quilt – any technique, any size, machine quilted by a long arm machine, name quilt maker and commercial quilter if applicable.
6. First quilt by an exhibitor – any size, any method

2. Entry Fee is \$5.00
3. Name of receiver of cheque to be indicated on entry sheet.
4. Two members must attend judging period—one to take notes and one to bring articles to and from the Judges.
5. Prizes will be awarded as follows: Prizes \$8;\$6 :\$4
6. Judging of articles other than food shall be based on the following criteria: workmanship 60%: Design 20%: appearance 20%
7. Articles must be the work of a Women's Institute member and exhibited for the Branch to which they belong
8. At least 10 out of 15 stated articles must be exhibited.
9. .Entries must be placed in the exhibit hall on WEDNESDAY AUGUST 11 between 6:00 and 8:00 and will remain until 3:00 p.m. on Sunday August 14.
10. Five feet of table space will be provided for each branch.
11. The Arnprior Agricultural Society will award \$20.00 to each Women's Institute Branch that sets up an attractive display for their entries.
12. Judging will be Thursday morning August 12, 2015 at 9.30 a.m

11. 3 Sugar Cookies on paper plate in plastic Ziploc bag.
12. 3 Butter Tarts, with raisins, on paper plate in Ziploc bag.
13. 3 White Cupcakes, decorated.
14. Strawberry Jam, (not Freezer) in a 250 ml preserving jar.
15. Pickled Beets in a 500 ml. Preserving jar.

VEGETABLES & FRUIT

CLASS D

Rules:

- 1 .Please bring your own plates or containers for vegetables and fruit classes. All vegetables to be shown on 9” disposable plate.
2. Vegetables will keep longer if not washed. Use a soft brush to gently remove excess soil and trim all root vegetables tops to 1 inch (except for new potatoes). Do not over-trim onions or garlic.
3. All entries must be home-grown by entrant.

CLASS E

Rules:

1. Cut flowers must be shown with long stems and where possible some foliage.
2. Cedar may be used to hold tall stems and for larger containers.
3. Containers must be supplied by the exhibitors. These must be easily moveable.
4. Potted plants must have been grown in their original container. Freshly dug plants will be disqualified.

CLASS F

BAKED GOODS SECTION

Rules:

1. Baking to be the work of the Exhibitor.
The whole pie or cake must be brought for judging. One piece will be removed for display. The rest of the pie or cake may be picked up by the exhibitor on Thursday evening between 5 and 9 p.m.
2. All bread and rolls in new plastic bags
3. All other baking covered with plastic/plastic bags on disposable plates.
4. No commercial mixes, or pie fillings
5. No paper liners on muffins or cupcake classes
6. Entry tags MUST be attached to the bag.
7. Prizes are awarded at the discretion of the Judge. If an entry is not worthy of a prize, it will not be awarded, even if there are no other entries.

Note: Buns are baked together, rolls are separate.
